

Tunnel 5 Fire: What To Know & Learn

As you've likely heard, the Tunnel 5 Fire started near Underwood on Sunday, July 2nd. As of July 6th, it has spread to approximately 550 acres and destroyed 10 homes. The fire remains 5% contained (what does "percent contained" really mean? Click here to learn more), with 461 firefighting personnel engaged. FACT wanted to take this opportunity to touch on several important resources, terms, and guidelines that can help you better understand the Tunnel 5 Fire—and be better prepared if a wildfire approaches Trout Lake.

- <u>Wildfire tracking information</u>. It can be confusing to find the most up-to-date information on an active wildfire. We recommend <u>InciWeb</u> for nation-wide fire information, the <u>DNR Wildfire Intel Dashboard</u> for statewide data, and the Columbia Gorge Wildland Fire Information Facebook page for frequent updates on local fires. The Skamania County Sheriff is posting notices about the Tunnel 5 Fire on <u>this webpage</u>.
- <u>Evacuation levels</u>. Currently, Skamania County residents within 2 miles of the Tunnel 5 Fire are under a Level 3 evacuation. Familiarize yourself with the three evacuation levels (see infographic on the left) and ensure you are signed up for Klickitat County emergency notifications (<u>click here to do so</u>) so you know what to do if Trout Lake is issued an evacuation alert.
- <u>Red Flag warnings</u>. All of Skamania County and much of the western slopes of the Cascades were recently under a Red Flag warning. These warnings are
 - issued when a combination of warm temperatures, low humidities, and high winds indicate high risk of fire spread.
- Emergency Go Bags. Now is the time to put together an emergency kit to grab during an evacuation. See below for a list of essentials to include.
