

Pine Engraver Best Practices



The pine engraver (*Ips*

pini) is a bark beetle that can (and does) cause lethal damage to pines in our area. These beetles love to infest fresh pine slash piles in the spring, where they build up their population before spreading to live, standing trees. **If you plan to cut pines this spring, please ensure you will be able to burn or chip your piles within 30 days.** Or, wait until Oct-Dec to create pine slash, so it can dry out over the winter. Wildfire Ready Trout Lake

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Free Chipping Services this Spring

Last month's newsletter was <u>all about pile burning</u>. However, burning is not the only way you can dispose of woody debris on your property. FACT, in collaboration with Mt. Adams Resource Stewards, is once again providing free mobile chipping services this spring! Here's what you need to know:

<u>What should I cut?</u> Check out <u>this site</u> to remind yourself of the principles of "defensible space." Particularly within a 30' radius of your home, the risk of ignition by wildfire can be substantially reduced by limbing up trees, clearing out downed woody debris and <u>ladder fuels</u>, increasing the spacing between trees, and removing limbs that overhang structures. How do I make piles? Neatness counts! See guidelines to the right.

When will the chipper come?

Chipping this year will be scheduled according to geographic area within Trout Lake, and will occur during May and early June. See the attached map (or <u>click here for an online version</u>) to find your designated chipping week. There is some leniency with scheduling if needed, but please do your best to have your piles ready by your designated week.

Building Piles for Chipping

DO

- Pile along accessible road/driveway.
- Stack branches neatly with butt ends facing access road.
- Limit piles to 4' tall.
- Make a plan for how to use your wood chips, as they will not be removed.



DON'T

- DON'T include the following in your piles:
 - Material larger than 8" in diameter or 10' in length.
- \otimes Dirt/rocks.
- ⊗ Stumps/logs
- <36" long. \otimes Inorganics.
- \otimes Thin, vine-y
- material.
- \otimes Trees/shrubs with thorns (e.g., hawthorn).
